Two different approaches to translations

- Formal: tries to stay as close as possible to the ______ of the source language⁴
 - Word for word
 - o Tries to recreate the text of the original audience
- Functional: tries to express the ______ in today's language⁵
 - o Thought for thought
 - o Tries to recreate the experience of the original audience
- Paraphrase: Does not go back to the original language takes a translation and restates it. (Living Bible, Amplified Bible)
